

Ushering in the United Church

Ottawa - in the city of Ottawa, on Feb. 15, 1925, there was ushered into existence the first United Church of the district - one of the first big-scale unions to take place in the Dominion.

On occasion of such importance, naturally, was not permitted to pass unnoticed. Special services marked not only the day itself but the week which followed and thousands of fervent Christians who attended acclaimed the Union movement as the most important in the religious world, since the reformation.

When a month made his speech at Gettysburg, a dozen sentences in all, scarcely one of the two score newspaper men present thought it worth reporting. They had no conception of the importance of the occasion.

Speaking strictly of the Presbyterians, the union movement has not usually added in such harmony and agreement. Commonly there has been a remnant that would not join the United church and many a new member.

Judge Speaks Late in Regina Libel Action

Court Sits Till 11 P.M. - Resumes at 10 Today

Regina, Sask., March 4. - In the libel action for \$50,000 damages brought against the Leader Publishing company, Ltd., by R. E. A. Leach, chairman of the Saskatchewan liquor commission, Mr. Justice MacKenzie finished his five-hour charge in the case shortly before 11 o'clock tonight. To the counsel engaged on both sides in the case he said if they had any applications they wished to make he would take them at 10 o'clock Thursday.

Mr. P. Thomson, counsel for the plaintiff, spent about four and one-half hours on his address to the jury. Towards the close of his address he charged the jury to find for the plaintiff. MANY NEWSPAPERMEN IN RUSSIA MURDERED

More Than Thousand Slain by the Peasantry Last Year
